Guidelines for Applications

The Western Australian School Library Association is offering assistance with funding for members to attend the Library Officers/Technicians Seminar to be held at Schools for Isolated and Distance Education, Leederville on Friday 10th October, 2008.

Guidelines for applications are as follows:

Persons will be considered for funding if they meet the guidelines outlined.

A maximum of 4 recipients will receive a proportion of a total of \$1,000 to go towards the cost of registration and up to \$200 expenses.

Applicants will submit their application submission stating:

- An outline of work history, including current position.
- Potential benefits for your school from attendance at the Seminar.
- Financial membership of WASLA (You may use either your School's membership or your personal membership).
- Involvement in professional development activities.

Successful applicants will be expected to:

- Use funds only to attend the Library Officers/Technicians Seminar.
- Submit a one page report for the WASLA newsletter outlining a seminar experience which will change your current practice.
- Submit the report to the WASLA Committee for newsletter publication.

A sub-committee of three will be appointed by WASLA for consideration of applications. This committee will:

- Consider all applications and select up to 4 recipients.
- Notify the President of WASLA of its decisions.
- Notify successful applicants by Monday 11 August, 2008.

People to People Australian School Library Professionals Delegation to China Led by Anette Ainsworth, Immediate Past President, Australian School Library Association December 14-22, 2008

People to People Citizen Ambassador Programs is honored to have Ms. Anette Ainsworth leading a delegation of Australian school library professionals to meet in China in December of 2008.

Ms. Ainsworth is Immediate Past President of the Australian School Library Association and Co-ordinator of Library at John XXIII College in Perth, Australia. She is also a past president of the Western Australian School Library Association. As the delegation leader, Ms. Ainsworth's involvement will greatly enhance the focus of the exchange. She believes you would contribute valued expertise to the mission, while gaining immeasurably from the experience.

Ms. Ainsworth has suggested the following initial topics of discussion, which will be further refined as the team is formed to incorporate delegates' specialized interests.

- To understand the role of libraries in schools in China.
- To gain an understanding of the range of resources that are available to students and what access the students have to the resources.
- To gain an understanding of the staffing of the libraries and what qualifications the staff have gained.
- Discuss courses that are available to those wishing to study to become qualified teacher librarians.
- Discover links that can be made between Chinese associations and similar associations in Australia Students in Australia often attend schools which have a resourced school library, at times with a qualified teacher librarian and support staff. Information communication technologies are generally available. The delegation would be able gain an understanding of what is available to students and the general public through their library environments both in urban and rural areas of China.

Since China has developed at a phenomenal rate in the information communication area, the delegation would be able to ascertain what is available and how it is utilized by students. The availability of these resources in both major and smaller locations and the impact it has on student learning would be of interest to those undertaking the journey.

The delegates would also contribute to the library and educational environments that are visited by sharing any pertinent knowledge about student learning, library management and use of resources.

The delegation will convene in Beijing, China on Sunday, December 12, 2008 with delegates making their own way to that city at their own expense. The initial briefing will take place the following morning with the professional meetings commencing that day as well. Following our professional and cultural program in Beijing, we will continue onto Guiyang for further professional and cultural exchange. Delegates return to their home destinations from Guiyang, China on Monday, December 22, following a farewell dinner on Sunday evening.

As a member of the delegation, you will represent your profession while advancing the ideals of People to People International, a nonpolitical, private-sector organization dedicated to promoting international understanding. Since its founding by President Eisenhower in 1956, People to People has developed high level professional exchanges to encourage dialogue with counterparts in other nations.

I invite you to bring an accompanying spouse or guest as well. A cultural and educational program will be arranged for your guest while you attend the professional sessions. Activities for guests will include visits to historical and cultural sites for an opportunity to explore many aspects of Chinese life, culture and customs. An optional excursion, after the main program, will take participating delegates and guests to Xi'an and Kunming, to enjoy a variety of cultural activities.

As People to People Citizen Ambassador Programs is a private-citizen effort, delegates are responsible for their own program costs. The estimated cost per delegate or guest is \$3250 USD. This includes, flights between Beijing and Guiyang, group transportation, meetings and cultural activities, accommodations, most meals, and essentially all other costs associated with participation.

Due to the extensive planning and communication involved in coordinating a program of this nature, *I ask that you respond with your intentions regarding this invitation as soon as possible.* We hope to hear from you whether you are able to join our delegation or not.

"Leading Learning: a guided inquiry approach" A one day seminar with Dr Ross Todd, Monday 1 September.

One of our well-known members, Gary Green, was recently presenting at the Sydney ALSA Conference and managed to speak with Ross Todd and also hear his keynote address. Regarding Ross's September seminar, Gary has this to say:

"This PD opportunity promises to be one of those hugely significant ones for teacher librarians that doesn't come along all that often. In essence it is all about the HOW - how we can move our current practice and pedagogy from the transactional to transformational. Its capacity to influence and drive change within our school communities is considerable."

It may almost seem we are being spoiled for PD this year, with the upcoming School Library Conference and other sessions offered by both WASLA and AISWA Libraries, but AISWA Libraries thought the opportunity for you to meet and hear Dr Ross Todd was too good to pass up. AISWA is offering a special deal for their members on Monday 1st September.

The cost is \$250 for the one-day seminar at Perth Convention Centre. AISWA Libraries will be subsidising each of their members who attends and it will cost them \$150. Morning tea, lunch and afternoon tea are included.

The seminar is based on cutting edge international research. Ross Todd is well known for his involvement in the ground-breaking Ohio schools research. More recently he has been involved in research with Pennsylvania Department of Education's Office of Commonwealth Libraries: "School Administrator's Support for School Libraries: The Impact on Student Achievement" along with Carol Gordon and Ya-Ling Lu.
