GREAT Southern school children had the chance to get up close and personal with some of their favourite authors as part of the inaugural Children's Literature Festival last week.

The festival, organised and hosted by Great Southern Grammar, celebrated WA children's literature with a two-day program of sessions with local and visiting authors Dianne Wolfer, Jon Doust, Leanne White, Meg McKinlay, Rebecca Cool and Wendy Binks.

GSG teacher and librarian Elinor Couper said the festival was the first of its kind in Albany, and hoped it would become an annual event.

"We decided to do it this year because it ties in really well with the National Year of Reading, which is all about encouraging and promoting literacy and reading," she said.

Ms Couper said schools had travelled from across the Lower Great Southern to take part in the festival

Schools attending included

South Stirling Primary School, Wellstead Primary School, Manypeaks Primary School, Parklands Primary School and Bethel Christian School.

"We decided to invite all schools from around Albany and the Great Southern to take part because smaller schools sometimes don't have the resources to bring in authors or celebrities for events like these," she said.

"Wellstead Primary School travelled 110km to be here today.

"The whole school came down, which was absolutely fantastic."

Denmark-born and Perth-b children's author Wendy B said it was a "great thing for region".

"It's been fantastic, it's a concept with all the schools ing in together to participate, said.

"I can imagine it becoming ly big."

Children's writer and poet McKinlay took part in both da the festival and said the aut had been well received by ex groups of students.
